





--► MEET THE ARTIST

Artists like JOHN BIGGERS must select what they want to record. Some artists focus on special events or important people. Others **show** ordinary people doing ordinary things, such as children playing in the rain or talking with friends. Some artists **observe** carefully and remember what they see, others make **sketches** and some take pictures to show record scenes or ideas for their final artworks. **Settings** are also important. The addition of buildings, scenery or objects put backgrounds into the recognizable world. Artists use **position**, **color or contrast** to show focal point or center of interest. In the picture to the left John Biggers, the artist, shows houses in a neighborhood called Third Ward in Houston, Texas. He calls the work *Shotgun*, *Third Ward#1*. The type of house that is shown in the artwork is called a shotgun house because it is narrow and deep with all rooms connecting to a single hallway. It is said that you could fire a shotgun strait through such a house. That is where the name originates.




Biggers was born in North Carolina. His Early works emphasized the struggles and everyday hardships of African Americans. Biggers was one of the first African American artist to travel to Africa in order to better understand African culture and incorporate it into his work.



ART AND WRITING EXERCISE


